## Safe Sport Track Report – USA Swimming Summit 2025

### I. Presentation Highlight - Colorado ICAC (Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force)

- Colorado ICAC, part of a DOJ-funded national task force (with Georgia ICAC being GBI), presented critical updates related to online child safety.
- Key discussion points included:
  - The role of NCMEC (National Center for Missing and Exploited Children) and its CyberTipline:

- CyberTipline receives reports from various platforms including:
  - Amazon Al, Microsoft, OpenAl, Discord, Kik, Cloudflare, Roblox, Pinterest, Adobe, Spotify, XBox, Sony, PayPal
  - In contrast, **Apple** reported only 250 cases in 2024.
- Al-generated CSAM (Child Sexual Abuse Material) is an emerging threat:
  - "Nudifier" apps can manipulate any image to create explicit content.
  - Many states, including Georgia, are updating laws to include Al-generated imagery.
  - Georgia HB 993 (2024) now allows prosecution for possession, sale, or distribution of Al-generated sexually explicit images of minors.

# II. Education for LSCs and Clubs Mandated Reporting (Georgia-Specific):

- All professionals, volunteers, coaches, teachers working with minors are mandated reporters under OCGA 19-7-5(c)(1).
- Reports must be made within 24 hours to:
  - Law enforcement (911)
  - o DFCS: 1-855-GA-CHILD
- Strong recommendation to double report (law enforcement + DFCS).

### III. Digital Safety and Parenting Resources

- Promote use of Parental Monitoring Apps:
  - Norton Family
  - Qustodio
  - MM Guardian
  - Google Family Link
  - Bark
- Parents, athletes, coaches, and officials should be made aware of these tools as preventative resources.

### IV. Prevention Over Prosecution – Policy Recommendations

- Clubs and LSCs must not base decisions solely on convictions, as criminal cases
  often lack physical evidence or witnesses.
- Instead, establish strong internal policies that:
  - Prevent unobservable or uninterruptible contact between adults and minors.
  - Allow consequences based on **policy violations**, not just legal thresholds.
- These proactive policies create inhospitable environments for abuse.

### V. Mental Health & Resilience

### Presented by: The Institute for Human Resilience

- Covered trauma, stress responses, and the hierarchy of human needs.
- Emphasized:
  - Meeting individuals where they are emotionally/mentally.
  - Recognizing vicarious trauma (e.g., officials or parents affected by abuse awareness).
  - Encouraging support-seeking behavior for all members of the swim community.
- Suggested resources:
  - "Leaders Eat Last" by Simon Sinek
  - Brené Brown's work on empathy vs. sympathy

# VI. Safe Sport Program Updates

### **Safe Sport Chair Responsibilities:**

- Focus on education and guidance.
- Not involved in investigations.
- Clarified differences between:

- USA Swimming Safe Sport (est. 2010, jurisdiction over USA Swimming members)
- U.S. Center for SafeSport (est. 2017 by federal act, jurisdiction over Olympic/Paralympic sports)

### **MAAP (Minor Athlete Abuse Prevention Policies):**

- Locker rooms must be monitored randomly and regularly.
- Adult-minor interactions must be observable and interruptible.
- Exceptions: emergencies, close-in-age (e.g., GA's Romeo & Juliet Law), dual relationships.

## **Mandatory Reporting:**

- **Sexual misconduct or physical abuse**: Must be reported to law enforcement and optionally Safe Sport.
- Other misconduct: Report directly to Safe Sport.

### Additional Considerations:

- Insurance/risk management: Know reporting requirements for "occurrence reports."
- USA Swimming insurance applies only to **USA Swim athletes at sanctioned events**.
- Be aware of differing policies for non-USA members (e.g., AAU athletes).

### VII. Safe Sport Recognition Program (SSRP) and Certification

- Many Zones now require SSRP certification to host sanctioned meets.
- Clubs should:
  - Encourage athlete certification (promotes self-awareness and responsibility).
  - Utilize **SWIMS** reports to monitor Safe Sport status.
  - Push for Safe Sport Certification across all stakeholders.

### VIII. Final Takeaways and Goals for GA LSC

- Build positive club and LSC cultures rooted in safety and trust.
- Push athlete, coach, and official Safe Sport education.
- Reinforce that child safety is the "why" behind Safe Sport.
- Equip clubs with:
  - Up-to-date policies
  - Clear reporting pathways
  - Preventative structures
  - Mental health awareness

#### Recommended Actions for GA LSC and Clubs

- 1. **Share resources** with parents and stakeholders (CyberTipline, <u>takeitdown.org</u>, FindHelpGA).
- 2. Conduct ongoing education on mandated reporting laws.
- 3. Review and strengthen **club policies** on supervision and adult-minor interactions.
- 4. Promote Safe Sport Certification and utilization of SWIMS data.
- 5. Provide **trauma-informed education** to coaches, officials, and club leaders.
- 6. Encourage all Safe Sport Chairs to **stay informed**, **network**, and **refer** rather than investigate.
